Adelaide Fringe is more than Australia's biggest arts festival. It's a place where emerging artists can make their start and where the arts is accessible to all. The Adelaide Fringe Foundation is the philanthropic arm of Adelaide Fringe, where every dollar raised is used to help artists present their work, to buy tickets for disadvantaged communities and make Fringe experiences as welcoming and accessible as possible.

Adelaide Fringe is a national drawcard for our State and you can contribute to ensuring its longevity. You can make a one-off or ongoing donation, with funds going to initiatives including Accessible Arts Fund, The Artists Fund and The Community Fund.

Accessible Arts Fund:

Of the one hundred and seventy grants awarded to artists this year, seventeen per cent of shows self-identify as having cast and creatives that are First Nations, thirty nine per cent are culturally and linguistically diverse, and forty four per cent are part of the L G B T Q I A + community.

Thanks to support from Lutheran Care, Adelaide Fringe will be able to distribute more tickets than ever before to disadvantaged groups who might otherwise not be able to attend Fringe.
